

Women's Recovery House

IBH Addiction Recovery announced the addition of certified women's recovery housing to our growing continuum of care in 2024. This came after the successful implementation of certified men's recovery housing in 2021.

Recovery housing plays a critical role in drug and alcohol addiction treatment by providing a structured, supportive environment that fosters a strong sense of community. This arrangement helps individuals transition from inpatient treatment programs to independent, sober living while stepping down to an outpatient level of care.



Ranked #2 by Newsweek

IBH Addiction Recovery was ranked the #2 Best Addiction Treatment Center in Ohio by *Newsweek* in 2024.

According to *Newsweek*, the rankings are intended to help patients and their loved ones find the most suitable places to begin their recovery journey. *Newsweek* partnered with Statista, a global data and business intelligence platform, to produce the fifth edition of America's Best Addiction Treatment Centers. The ranking awards 400 inpatient, long-term and residential addiction treatment centers in the 25 states where these facilities are most numerous.



Impactful Services

The number of accidental overdose deaths in Summit County went down from 203 in 2023 to 106 in 2024. IBH Addiction Recovery's impact can be seen in those numbers by looking at the growth of Summit County residents in our care, from 829 in 2023 to 894 in 2024. IBH Addiction Recovery literally saves lives.


